THE DOVER AND WINDSOR GATES ARE BEING RESTORED THANKS TO OUR GENEROUS NEIGHBORS!









At our annual meeting a year ago in February 2017, your HVNA board announced a major initiative to restore our historic 90-year old entryway gates on Old Chapel Hill Road at Windsor Way and Dover. Some would call this a BHAG (Big Hairy Audacious Goal). These beautiful structures were designed by the famous architect Aymar Embury II and were originally constructed in 1926. Over the years, time, severe weather and vehicle accidents have taken their toll.

The first order of business was to raise the funds needed to do this important restoration work. By late fall, thanks to nearly 300 generous gifts from many neighbors, we raised over \$42,000, thus exceeding our \$40,000 goal. And this past February, at our 2018 HVNA Annual meeting, the Town and Country Garden Club presented us with a \$3000 donation to do landscaping work once construction is completed.

With funding in hand, actual construction began in October, 2017. Our general contractor is Gateway Building Company, a local Durham construction firm.

The structural analysis is being done by Pro-Tech Construction from Raleigh and the painting and coatings work is being done by Hansell Painting also of Durham NC. First order of business was the removal of decades of paint and coatings in order to better assess the condition of the original castings and carved structures.

Then, much of the stucco was removed and repairs made. In the past month or so, waterproofing materials have been applied and most of the new stucco work completed. The remaining work includes getting the precast tops for the pillars at Dover as well as performing drainage work at both sites in order to keep standing water from undermining the integrity of all structures. As soon as the weather cooperates, our gates will then be painted. Lastly, new drought tolerant and deer resistant (if there is such a thing) landscaping will be installed.

Again, we want to thank all our neighbors whose financial assistance has made this project possible and we trust that our newly renovated entryways will endure another 90 years.






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Hope Valley Burglaries

- 2015 through 2017 -



The number of burglaries in our Hope Valley neighborhood were slightly behind those of last year. In 2017, we experienced 15 burglaries; in 2016 we saw 16. However, our burglaries this year have to be evaluated in the context of the fact that three of the 15 burglaries this year occurred at Hope Valley Country Club; so residential burglaries are actually four less in 2017 when compared to the number of residential burglaries in 2016. When compared to the same period in 2014 and 2015, the number of burglaries during the past two years have been significantly reduced. In 2014, we experienced 27 burglaries; in 2015, we had 32.

Larcenies have continued to occur at a very low level; in 2017, we had only had five. We have had one car stolen (unlocked, with the keys left inside). And, unfortunately, in 2017 we recently had our first robbery since 2015.


Our friends in the Durham Police Department suggest we call '911' if we see anything or anyone suspicious in the neighborhood. In addition, they recommend we take the following precautionary actions:

- Ensure our homes are locked and house alarms are armed when we are working in the yard, away and at night
- Watch out for any suspicious activity around our homes and around the homes of our neighbors
- If cars cannot be parked in the garage, ensure that any valuables are removed (or out of sight) and cars are locked

Burglary is defined as the criminal offense of breaking and entering into any dwelling or building illegally with the intent to commit a felony or crime. Larceny is the taking of someone elses property without the use of force.

Larceny is defined as the the wrongful taking and carrying away of the personal goods of another from his or her possession with intent to convert them to the taker's own use.

Robbery is defined as the felonious taking of the property of another from his or her person or in his or her immediate presence.



An Interview with Bob Byrnes - HVCC Head Golf Professional -

Bob Byrnes is convinced he has the best job there is. As the lead golf professional at Hope Valley Golf and Country Club (HVCC), his first nine years have been great, he says.

It's all about the different hats he wears as the man in charge of golf operations, a division under the general manager of the HVCC, and the relationships, Byrnes said. Members are the focus of his efforts as he teaches, does administrative chores, and oversees the pro shop. "The greatest thing about Hope Valley is the membership, the membership-based relationships," he said.

Right now, he's working on preparations for a new event that will showcase talented young golfers 13 to 18 years old. The Hope Valley Junior Invitational will be on the Donald Ross-designed course Aug. 13-18. That project is the brainchild of member Alan Smith and will be produced in cooperation with the North Carolina Community Foundation, he added. It will be an opportunity for college recruiters to scout potential scholarship players, among other things.

Also on tap later this year is the Western Women's Golf Association's junior women's championship tournament, the first of two times the WWGA will appear at Hope Valley. And those are just the new items on the calendar.

Byrnes came to Hope Valley from Naples, FL, where he was director of golf for a 36-hole operation . When Marty Lindsey let him know about the opportunity at HVCC, Byrnes was not a stranger to the region. He graduated from Elon and worked at Treyburn from 1992-1995 before going to Greensboro's Forest Oaks Country Club from 1995 to July 2000, then to the Naples Mediterra courses.

At Hope Valley, member-based relationships are the key to the success of the programs Byrnes works with, he said. Goals include having programs for the full spectrum of players, from the most casual to the most intense, and growing future golfers, one of the big challenges just now. "I want to grow the game and serve our members," Byrnes said.

The junior invitational is part of that effort to reverse the contraction in golfing's numbers. He worries that kids are not taking up the game.

Working with the members' golf committee, Byrnes focuses on assuring continuing quality programs for all different types of members, from beginners to core golfers. Ninety per cent of golf tournaments at HVCC are internal, for the members. Involving more members in deciding what those programs will be has paid off, Byrnes said, pointing to the addition of HVCC lady golfers' input as a useful perspective in tuning the offerings.

Operating a golf course is complicated. One aspect, the groundskeeping, requires attention to detail. Byrnes credited Dr. David Lee, the golf course superintendent, for the well-trained groundskeepers and the efficient routine they follow to maintain the high quality course.

There are substantial business management challenges in being the HVCC golf pro. For Byrnes, the key to everything is to "make sure we're providing the level of service our membership deserves." Byrnes and his No. 2, Frank Zappulla, teach golfers (more than 100 lessons some months), run a first rate pro shop, and work constantly on Byrnes' most important goals, "grow the game and serve our members." There are also programs like the Course and Courts effort with golf, tennis, cooking, arts and crafts that introduce the newer generations to the amenities of HVCC.

Byrnes is at home on a golf course. He took up the game at the age of 8 and has been a member of the PGA for 24 years. His best round ever was a 63 "as a youth" and his best round in competition was a 67. He grew up in Newburgh, NY.

He and his family live in Cary.





Early residents owned horses that where boarded at nearby Hope Valley Stables. During the Depression, it is believed that some residents actually kept their horses at their homes.


The above photos show scenes of horseback riding by early residents of our neighborhood.

The top photo shows riders on Dover Road in front of the The Pierson House (now owned by the Townsends), taken from across the 12th fairway of Hope Valley Golf Course. Hope Valley Stables was located behind this house.

The second photo is of riders on Dover Road, near the intersection with Exeter.

The third photo shows Hope Valley riders somewhere around Hope Valley Golf Course.
